Indonesia, is the world's largest archipelago, stretching some 5,120 kilometres from west to east, 1,760 kilometres from north to south, and comprising over 17,000 islands. It is a country blessed with countless wonders of diverse culture and magnificent nature, a country of transitions and contrasts, where spellbinding beaches mark the threshold between ocean and rainforest; where religious traditions shift from island to island, and the eco-zones of Asia and Australia meet and mingle in the Lombok Strait.

Seeded throughout this floating world, from the culturally rich of Java and jungle interior of Bali to the hidden paradise shores of Moyo Island, five Aman destinations each provide distinct perspectives on the nation's nature and culture, while Aman's oceangoing phinisi yacht invites travellers on voyages to untouched atolls and isles unspoilt.



Faces of Indonesia



Indonesia is a complex place of varied human and environmental patterns. This variety and diversity are seen as the key defining characteristic of the country - the very essence of the personality of Indonesia.

Culturally, Indonesia appears extremely diverse. Each community has its own culture and follows its adat (customary law). Some 700 languages are spoken and over 1,300 ethnic groups have been recognised. Yet there are also remarkable similarities between cultures across the archipelago. Common cultural elements appear to be ancient, with differences in geography, economy, spiritual beliefs, and history producing the present cultural richness. 'Bhinneka Tunggal Ika', the country's motto, means 'Unity in Diversity'.

Island hopping across Indonesia is not just a geographic journey, but the crossing of a cultural and spiritual bridge, as Adam H. Graham discovers.



Travelling to Indonesia

Climate

Indonesia is right at the equator while Java, Bali, and Moyo Island are situated between six to nine degrees south of the equator. Indonesia enjoys a warm, tropical climate year-round. The weather is particularly pleasant from June through September. The wet season runs from November to March. But even during the heaviest rains, the sun is rarely out of sight for long. The mean temperature is 27.2°C (81°F).

Language

Bahasa Indonesia is the official national language and is used throughout the Indonesian archipelago. English is widely used in daily conversations in Bali and Jakarta and is increasingly spoken in other destinations. Other major languages used in each Aman Indonesia destination are Javanese, Balinese, and Sumbawane. Dutch is still understood by the older generation while French, German, and Japanese have a smaller following in the tourist trade.

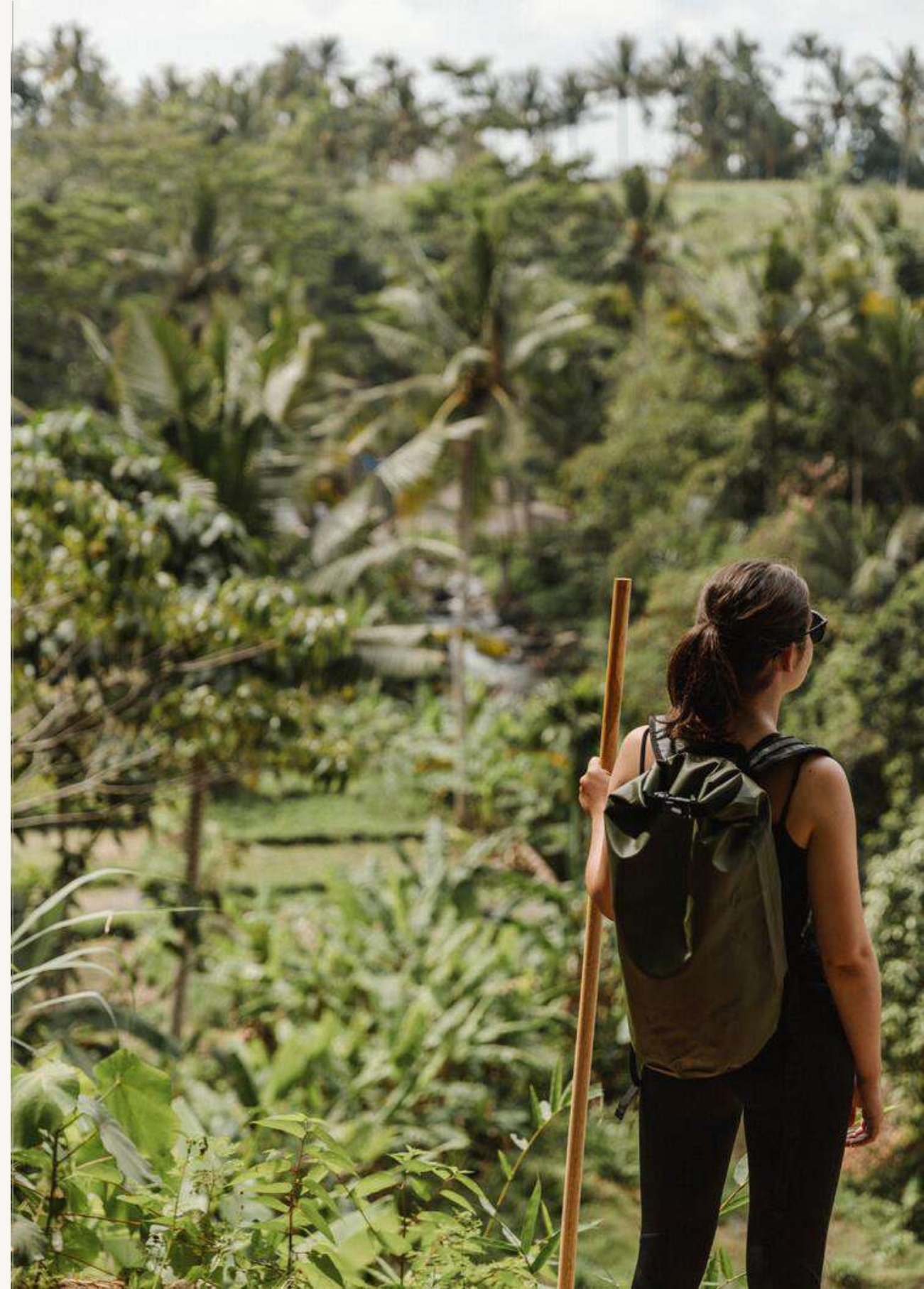
Currency

The national currency is the Indonesian Rupiah (IDR). The bills are issued between 1,000 and 100,000 Rupiahs while coinage runs from 100 to 1,000. Moneychangers readily change most currencies but not always traveller's cheques. Credit cards are widely accepted by hotels, restaurants, tour operators, and other large establishments.

Immigration

Visitors from certain countries require a tourist visa in advance, some can obtain these on arrival at international airports and some visitors do not require a visa at all. Prices also vary. Tourist visas are valid for up to thirty days and Passports must be valid for at least six months from the arrival date and should have at least four full blank pages.

Island of Java

ISLAND OF JAVA



The most important island in the world's largest archipelago, Java is at the centre of Indonesian culture and industry. Stretching more than 1,000 kilometres, Java is framed by the Indian Ocean to the south and the Java Sea to the north, with Sumatra bordering its west coast and Bali immediately to the east. The volcanic, ruggedly beautiful island of Java is about the size of England. Its population, however, is nearly half of Indonesia's entire population.

The province of Central Java, in the middle of the island, is a land of mountains and rice fields, hidden villages, and historic temples – including one of the greatest treasures of the ancient world, the UNESCO-preserved 8th-century Buddhist complex of Borobudur.

Amanjiwo in Central Java can be reached by several daily domestic flights to Yogyakarta from Indonesia's capital, Jakarta, and from Bali. Direct international flights are available from Singapore and Malaysia.

In a natural amphitheatre formed by hills and rice paddies, Amanjiwo's temple-like structure forms an architectural echo of Borobudur, whose stupas rise from the forest canopy just a couple of kilometres away. Against a backdrop of monument and mountain, volcano and plain, the resort's coral-coloured stone pavilions, sunken outdoor baths, and garden terraces nurse a sense of sanctuary and serenity that cannot fail to settle the soul.

The rugged landscape of the Menoreh Hills is crisscrossed with trails, rewarding hikers, bikers, and picnickers with jaw-dropping views at every turn. Both rambling and riding routes can be tailored to for all, but the boldest of ramblers can tackle the steep slopes of Mount Merapi, or undertake an early-morning guided hike up the Menoreh Hills, to be rewarded by a spectacular sunrise view – and an Aman breakfast – at the summit.

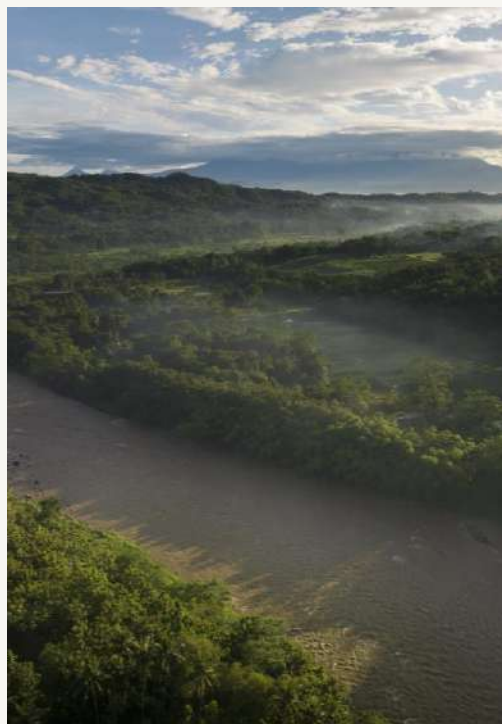
Train journey with Aman

The resort overlooks the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Borobudur, one of Buddhism's most sacred Mahayana temples. Perfectly placed for exploring the region's historic, artistic and cultural highlights, or for simply relaxing in blissful surroundings, the resort lies at the foot of the Menoreh Hills, cascading gracefully from a lofty rotunda down the hillside to a magnificent swimming pool.

RECURRING EVENTS IN JAVA

Pasar Papringan Ngadiprono

Every Sunday Wage & Pon (Javanese Calendar)
at Ngadiprono village, Temanggung

approximately 1 hour and 45 minutes drive from Amanjiwo

Pasar Papringan is held every Sunday Wage and Pon from 6.00am until 12.00pm. Pasar means to market, and Papringan means 'bamboo garden'. So from the name, it is clear that Pasar Papringan is a market in a bamboo garden. While Wage and Pon are the names of the days in the Pancawara (Pasaran) system of the Javanese calendar. One week of the Javanese calendar is five days, similar to the Balinese calendar. Besides Wage and Pon, there are also Pahing, Kliwon, and Legi.

Pasar Papringan is developed and managed by Spedagi Movement together with Mata Air Ngadiprono community, aiming to help build the economy of the village in which the market is located, and make it a financially and environmentally sustainable and independent community.

One thing that is very interesting about this market is its payment system. Guests can't use regular money. Instead, you have to use 'Pring'. 1 Pring was worth IDR 2,000. Guests exchange this Pring to shop throughout the market. The market sells traditional food and drinks, as well as anything bamboos such as traditional toys made from bamboo, bamboo baskets, and locally grown agricultural products such as pumpkin, cassava, chilies, and many more.

It is known that the presence of Classical European music at the Yogyakarta Palace has existed since the leadership of Sri Sultan Hamengku Buwono I (1755-1792). During the reign of Sri Sultan Hamengku Buwono II (1792-1810), the presence of western musical instruments such as trumpets and drums were used in the Military Music Corps. in 1805

The existence of this music corps continued to grow until the era of Sri Sultan Hamengku Buwono V (1823-1855) who took the initiative to include European musical instruments such as trumpets, trombones, and clarinets to accompany Javanese traditional cultural performances the Bedhaya, Srimpi, and Beksan Trunajaya dances.

This marriage of two cultures continue to the reign of Sri Sultan Hamengku Buwono VIII (1921-1939) when the Yogyakarta Palace had a Brass Orchestra led by Walter Spies, a multi-talented German artist who was part of the Pita Maha cultural movement in Bali.

Yogyakarta Royal Orchestra was inaugurated on 21 June 2021 by KHP Kridhomardowo, Head of the Performing Arts Division of the Yogyakarta Palace, which coincided with the World Music Day celebration. The orchestra held regular performances within the Special Region of Yogyakarta.

Wayang Kulit, Javanese Shadow Puppets

Wayang comes from the word “Ma Hyang” meaning a journey toward the realm of spirituality. It also said that Wayang originated from a Javanese word meaning shadow, hence the “shadow puppet” translation in English. While the term referred to the entire Wayang Kulit performance, most of the time the puppet itself is referred to as wayang. In 2003, UNESCO acknowledged Indonesian Wayang, including Wayang Kulit, as a Masterpiece of Oral and Intangible Heritage of Humanity.

The stage of a wayang performance includes a stretched linen canvas (kelir) that acts as a canvas, dividing the dalang (puppeteer) and the spectator. A coconut oil lamp (Javanese blencong or Balinese damar) – which in modern times is usually replaced with electric light – casts shadows onto the screen. A banana trunk (Javanese gedebog, Balinese gedebong) lies on the ground between the screen and the dalang, where the figures are stuck to hold them in place.

In a Javanese Wayang Kulit performance, the dalang may use a cymbal-like percussion instrument at his feet to cue the musicians. The musicians sit behind the dalang in a gamelan orchestra setting. The gamelan orchestra is an integral part of the Javanese wayang kulit performance. The performance is accompanied by female singers (pesinden) and male singers (wirasuara).

Wayang Wong is a kind of Wayang Kulit (shadow puppets) performance where the puppets were replaced by human dancers. It adapts the aesthetics and narratives from leather shadow puppets into a full theatrical dance performance which includes visual aesthetics, such as facial makeup, headdress, weaponry, and entire costume attire.

The Wayang Wong performance adapts leather shadow puppet-like movements to a very detailed body movements. The movements of the wayang wong performer are generally fluid and solemn, and recitation is extremely stylised.

Performances of wayang wong are regularly staged in the Javanese cultural heartlands, the court cities of Yogyakarta, and Surakarta (Solo). A series of well-known dramatic monthly evening performances of Wayang Wong from the Ramayana epic is performed all year round at the Prambanan Temple near Yogyakarta. The most complete Ramayana Wayang Wong involving more than a hundred dancers, artists, and gamelan musicians is performed only during the dry season (usually May to October) on a large, open-air stage with the Prambanan Trimurti temples as the background. In downtown Yogyakarta, Wayang Wong is also performed every night, at the Sonobudoyo Museum nearby the Yogyakarta Royal Palace.

SPECIAL EVENTS IN JAVA

JANUARY

Labuhan Keraton Yogyakarta

30 January
 at Parangkusumo Beach,
 Mt. Lawu, and Mt. Merapi

approx. 2 hours drive to Parangkusumo Beach from Amanjiwo

approx. 4 hours drive to Mt. Lawu from Amanjiwo

The Labuhan ceremony is a traditional ceremony that has been carried out since the time of the Islamic Mataram Kingdom in the 13th century until now in the Special Region of Yogyakarta. The name Labuhan is derived from the word Labuh which means "to throw", "put", or "wash away". The purpose of this ceremony is to get rid of all kinds of bad traits. The Labuhan ceremony is conducted by the Yogyakarta Palace at three sacred sites: Mount Merapi, Parangkusumo Beach, and Mount Lawu, by drowning and burying relics and items with high spiritual significance.

MARCH

MesaStila Rails to Trails

Ambarawa is a small town that holds cultural and historical importance in Central Java, where the famous antique steam train was operated from Ambarawa to Magelang. Its old train station has now been converted into a museum and is the first railway museum in Indonesia. A legacy from the Dutch colonial era, this train is an important tourism asset in this area. Rails to Trails is a cross-country race or run trail whose route runs along the old rail track and crosses the antique steam train bridge, a race that became a pioneer of trail running competitions in Indonesia.

This 16km race is starting from Ambarawa old train station, passes Bedono station, and finishes at MesaStila. Its scenic route offers views and beauty of the Ambarawa mountains, coffee and rubber plantations, rice fields, and villages in the districts of Semarang and Magelang.

MARCH

Grebeg Syawal

20 March
at Pagelaran Kraton Yogyakarta
to Kauman Grand Mosque

approximately 1 hour and 15 minutes drive from Amanjiwo

The word Grebeg is a Javanese term for traditional celebration or a carnival, usually for, but not exclusive to, Islamic events, such as the commemoration of the birth of the Prophet Muhammad, the Islamic New Year, and Eid al-Fitr. Grebeg Syawal refers to the last one, Eid al-Fitr.

During Grebeg Syawal, the Yogyakarta Palace crafted the biggest Gunungan, a gigantic mountain-shaped offering, resembling a Tumpeng.

This Gunungan contains various agricultural products such as long beans, carrots, large red chillies, sugar cane, salted eggs, klenyem (made of cassava filled with palm sugar), and at the bottom of the mountain are cones of white rice and side dishes.

Gunungan symbolises gratitude towards the Supreme Being and the King and his subjects and all the courtiers of the Palace who have successfully completed fasting for a full month. This tradition is a hereditary legacy from Sultan Agung, the great King of the Mataram Kingdom, which has been preserved until now.

Java Paper Balloon Festival

23 to 27 March
at Kembaran village, Wonosobo

Java Paper Balloon attraction is an annual event held in Wonosobo Regency, Central Java. Flying paper balloons is usually done by the region's residents at every Eid celebration. The balloon is a symbol of acculturation, where the Chinese, Dutch, and Javanese influences blend harmoniously. The balloon shape was influenced by Dutch, the paper material came from Chinese, and the Batik patterns are native to Java.

During the festival, the paper balloons were flown at a height of 15 to 30 metres using firewood smoke and then arranged so that they swayed to the sound of the Lengger dance gamelan music.

MAY

Tri Suci Waisak

31 May to 1 June

approximately 15 minutes drive from Amanjiwo

The Vesak Day celebration is one of the most awaited events that is held annually at the Borobudur Temple complex in Magelang, only a 5-minute drive from Amanjiwo and less than an hour away from the Special Region of Yogyakarta.

Vesak commemorates three of the most important events in the life of Buddha Siddhartha Gautama, also known in Indonesia as Tri Suci Waisak (Three Holy Days of Vesak). The first one is the Birth of Prince Siddhartha in the Lumbini Gardens. The second is the enlightenment in which Prince Siddhartha became the Buddha in Bodhgaya at the age of 35, and the third is the passing of Gautama Buddha at Kusinara at the age of 80 in 543 BC. Vesak is also known as simply Buddha's day.

The Vesak Day rituals are held according to the annual tradition, initially by obtaining the holy water from Umbul Jumprit spring in Temanggung. The next ritual will be getting the flames of eternal fire from Mrapen in Grobogan. Both will then be kept safely at Mendut temple, located in one straight line with Pawon and the Borobudur Temple itself. The next day, the holy water and the flame will be escorted from Mendut Temple to Borobudur Temple to join the Vesak Day procession, before the famous lantern release starts. Throughout these three days of processions, Amanjiwo is hosting its annual Vesak retreat experiences, guided by its Resident Anthropologist Patrick Vanhoebrouck together with Javanese spiritual practitioners from the surrounding region.

JUNE

ArtJog

19 June to 30 August

at Jogja National Museum, Yogyakarta

approximately 1 hour and 15 minutes drive from Amanjiwo

ARTJOG is an annual contemporary art exhibition held in the Special Region of Yogyakarta, which is usually held for one whole month in the period between May and July. The exhibition is regarded as the benchmark of contemporary art in Indonesia as it always showcases both local and international artists from various circles and their works – from two-dimensional and three-dimensional artworks, digital and physical, to performance art and art installations.

Since its inception in 2010, ARTJOG's iconic trademark is its main venue, where commissioned artists showcase their thematic, commissioned works. Individuals and art collectives that have been commissioned by ARTJOG are expected to respond to the theme given to them accordingly and translate it into a stunning visual display.

Another special feature of ARTJOG is the very well-organised fringe events that include curatorial tours, meet-the-artist sessions, art performances, and even a historical tour of the Jogja National Museum, which used to be the art school ASRI – the predecessor of Institut Seni Indonesia Yogyakarta (The Indonesian Institute of Art Yogyakarta). In addition, there is a special "viewing" for art collectors at the beginning of the event, so they can learn about the price and the artworks in detail.

Wisuda Lengger

Schedule to be advised
at Giyanti village, Wonosobo

approximately 1 hour and 40 minutes drive from Amanjiwo

Wisuda Lengger Giyanti is a rite culture that has taken place in Dusun Giyanti, Wonosobo Regency since the 1970s. But the dance itself has been part of the Javanese community for centuries. Referring to the name of this procession (wisuda means "graduation"), Wisuda Lengger must be carried out by the art students of the traditional Lengger Dance. The students must pass both theoretical, historical, and practical exams in several dance studios in Giyanti village, before officially being confirmed as a Lengger dancer.

Lengger is derived from the Javanese word 'Elinga Ngger', an advise to always remember the Almighty and do good deeds to others. The historic manuscript stated that the Lengger dance was once used by Sunan Kalijaga, one of the nine saints of Java, to introduce religious values.



Solo Batik Carnival

July
at Sriwedari Stadium to Fort Vastenburg,
Surakarta

approximately 2 hours and 30 minutes drive from Amanjiwo

The Solo Batik Carnival is an annual carnival celebration that occurs in Solo City also known as Surakarta City in Indonesia. It first began in 2008 as an annual celebration of Indonesian heritage and culture and to showcase Batik, an Indonesian technique of wax-resist dyeing of cloth and other wearables. Batik itself has been officially recognised by UNESCO as a Masterpiece of the Oral and Intangible Heritage of Humanity from Indonesia.

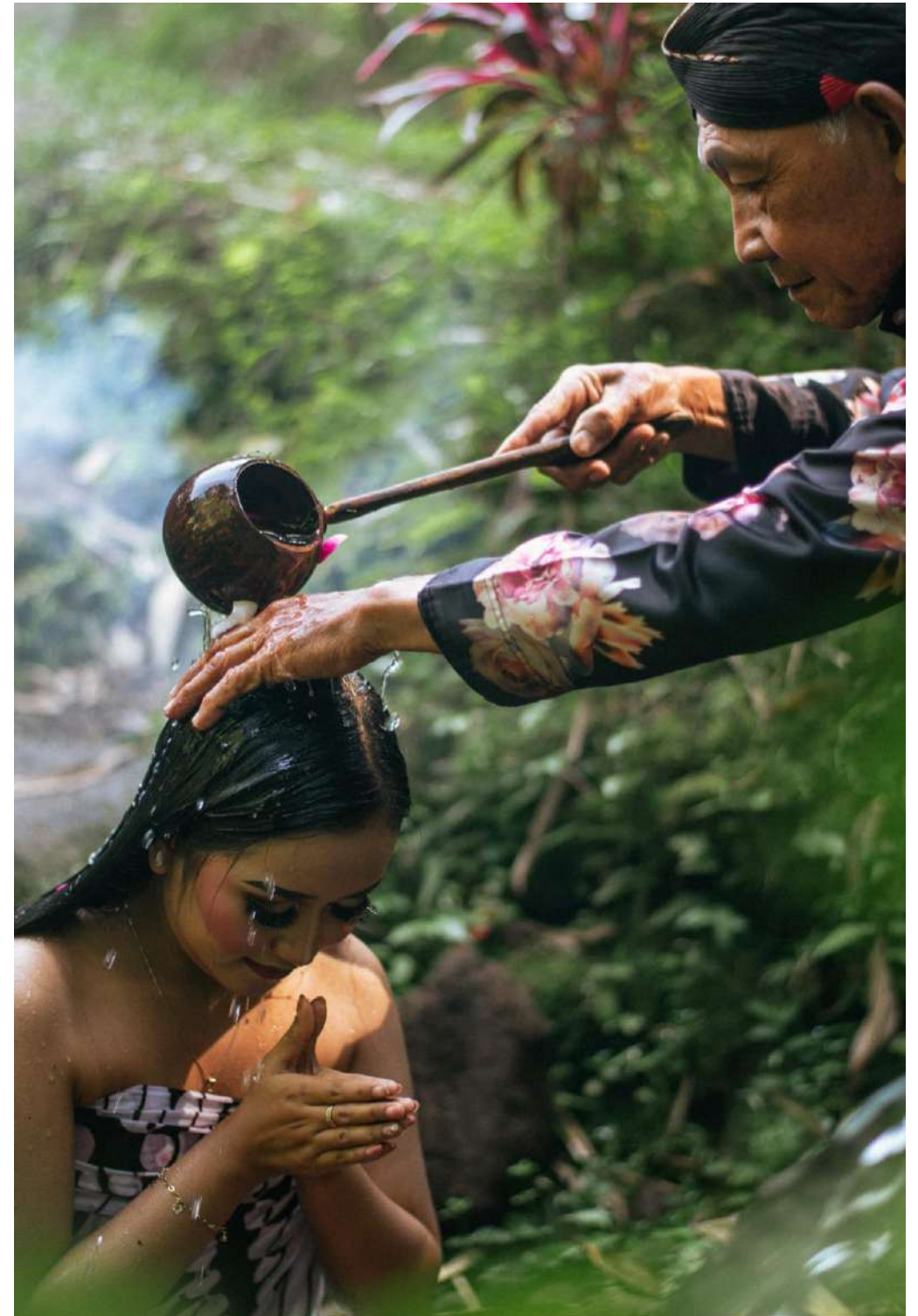

OCTOBER

Biennale Jogja

October - November
at Taman Budaya Yogyakarta, Yogyakarta

Known as a flagship exhibition that showcases contemporary art practice and discourse, the Jogja Biennale has contributed significantly to the dynamic of the local and regional art scene in Indonesia and Southeast Asia particularly. The exhibition is held every 2 years since 1988.

The exhibition program includes the Equator Symposium, an international sub-event involving art and culture specialists and practitioners from around the globe. Within the framework of an expert and knowledgeable discourse, the Equator Symposium will be cross-disciplinary, although its focus of attention is contemporary art.

MesaStila 100

MesaStila100 is part of Grand Slam Ultra Indonesia, a unique and extreme ultra trail running event that invites runners to cross and climb up to five mountains in Central Java: Mount Andong (1,726m), Mount Merbabu (3,145m), Mount Merapi (2,930m), Mount Telomoyo (1,894m), and Mount Gilituri (1,368m). The running event is divided into five categories: 120km, 75km, 50km, 25km, and 12km.

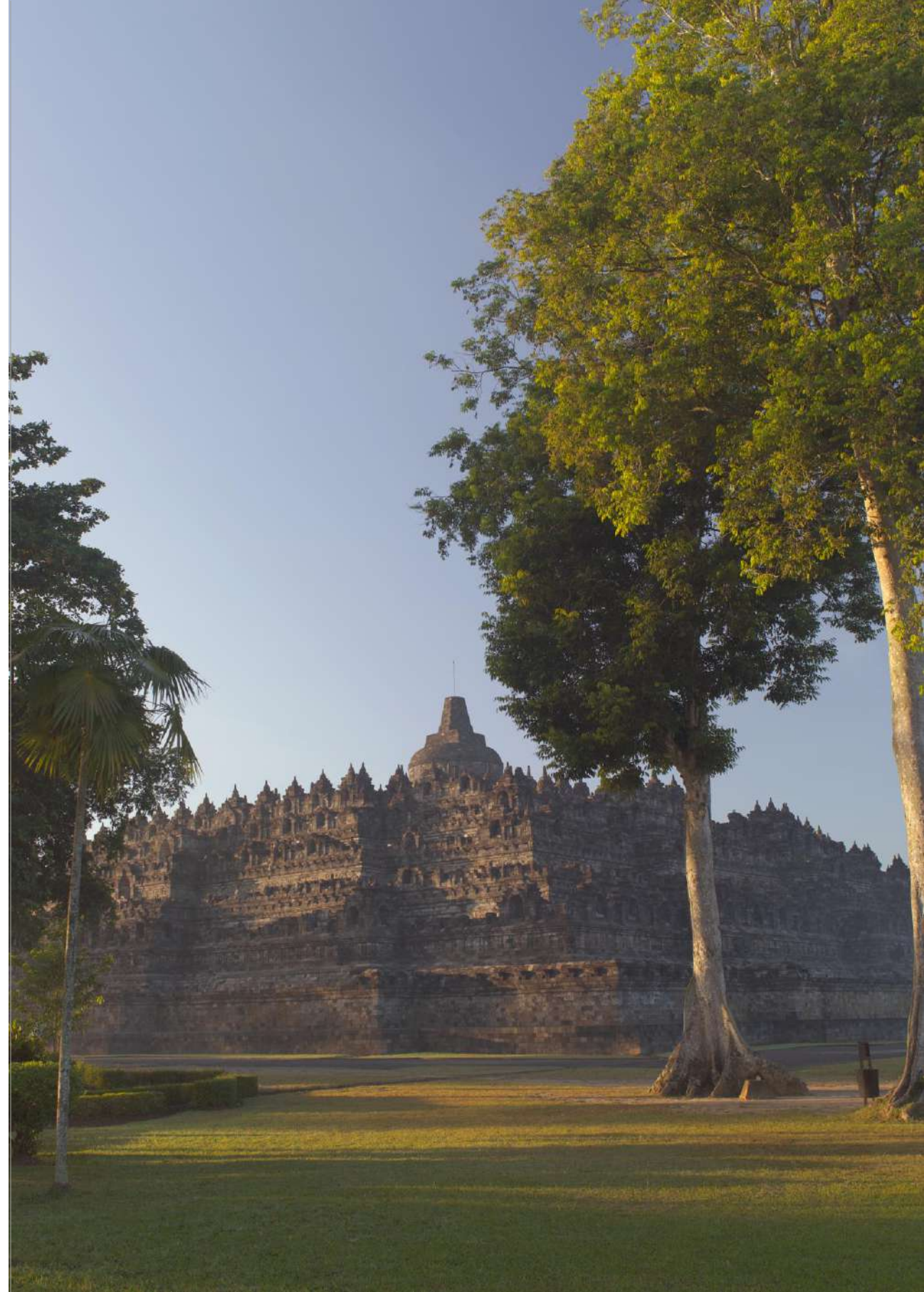

Amandari Ubud, Bali

Discover the unique lives of the Balinese, their Hindu rituals, and unique craftsmanship through tours or comprehensive activities from Amandari, offering guests unrivaled access to the island's captivating soul.

The breathtaking site atop the untouched Ayung River Gorge was chosen for the location of Amandari for its lush serenity, unparalleled views, and sacred connection to Kedewatan Village nearby.

Amankora Kingdom of Bhutan

Bhutan is a global pioneer, the first nation of the world to systematically measure its success not by the strength of its economy but by the happiness of its people. Such a unique approach befits a country unlike any other - a wild, spiritual and majestic mountain kingdom where tranquility reigns and everything is off the beaten track.

Amansara Siem Reap, Cambodia

The foundation of the Angkor period in Cambodian history started with the consecration ritual conducted by Jayavarman II, who lived in Java, in the early 800s in Phnom Kulen, to celebrate the independence of the Khmer Empire from Java.

At that ceremony, he proclaimed a universal monarch (Kamraten jagad ta Raja in Khmer) or Devaraja / God King. According to some sources, he had resided for some time in Java during the reign of the Sailendra Dynasty (The Lords of Mountains), and as such the concept of Devaraja or God King was borrowed from Java. At that time, the Sailendra Dynasty allegedly ruled over Java, Sumatra, the Malay Peninsula, and parts of Cambodia.





ISLAND OF BALI



Bali is located at the heart of the Indonesian archipelago. Its north coast faces the Bali Sea, while the southern coast is lapped by the Indian Ocean. The island is just two kilometres off the eastern tip of Java. For all its cultural richness, Bali is a small island, less than 150km from east to west and only about 80km from north to south. The island has four million people, most of whom still live in villages and small towns. Bali's unique variant of Hinduism influences every aspect of island culture, from day-to-day village life to art, dance and music.

Bali's age-old appeal to explorers, beach seekers, yogis and those seeking the salve of the spiritual has made it the most beloved travel destination in Indonesia. It is an island of near-infinite variety, from the gloriously green, artistically rich Ubud region at the centre, to the villages and volcanoes of East Bali. For those in search of sand and sunshine, Bali has palm-fringed shores to suit. And for travellers who seek to reap more spiritual rewards, an abundance of open-air Hindu temples offer opportunities for blessings and reflection. There is a reason they call this 'the Island of the Gods'.

As one of the most accessible destinations in Southeast Asia, daily flights are available from most major cities in Asia and Australia. Travellers from the United States or Europe tend to fly via Singapore. There are also domestic flights and ferry connections from the surrounding Indonesian islands.

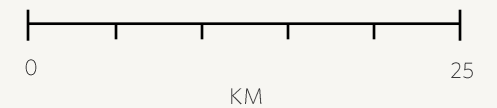

The Peaceful Spirit

Ubud is the spiritual heart of Bali, a vital valley of thriving jungle surrounding a town alive with art. Here, on a ridge above the Ayung River valley, Amandari takes its inspiration from the layout and architecture of a traditional Balinese settlement, integrated so sensitively into its surroundings that it feels as though it has always been here.

The resort is tightly woven into the everyday life of the neighbouring village, Kedewatan, where many of the team live, and local children come to the grounds daily for their dance class since the resort opened in 1989. The dramatic temple of Uluwatu Temple rises from the surf and Kecak dancers retell myths and legends through dance and drama. Originally created in the 1930s, Kecak Dance is a collaboration between Balinese dancer Wayan Limbak and the German artist Walter Spies. The dance combines a traditional pre-Hindu Balinese trance chant with the famous story of Ramayana.

What makes this dance particularly unique is that the drama uses no artificial backdrop and involves no musical instrument. The focus is entirely on the concentric circles of about 50-60 men, bare-chested, wearing only distinct Balinese sarongs sitting cross-legged around a set of torches in the centre.

Instead of the traditional “gamelan” orchestra which usually accompanies other Balinese traditional performances, the Kecak is simply accompanied by the chanting of the chorus of men representing an army of monkeys continuously intoning “Cak! Cak! Cak!” or “Keh-Chak” in polyrhythmic sounds during almost the entire performance. -

- This amazing human-voiced orchestra is led by a soloist, who is in charge of indicating the high and low notes, and also acts as narrator. The effect, after a while, is to provide a wall of dramatic sound against which the action of the play is enacted.

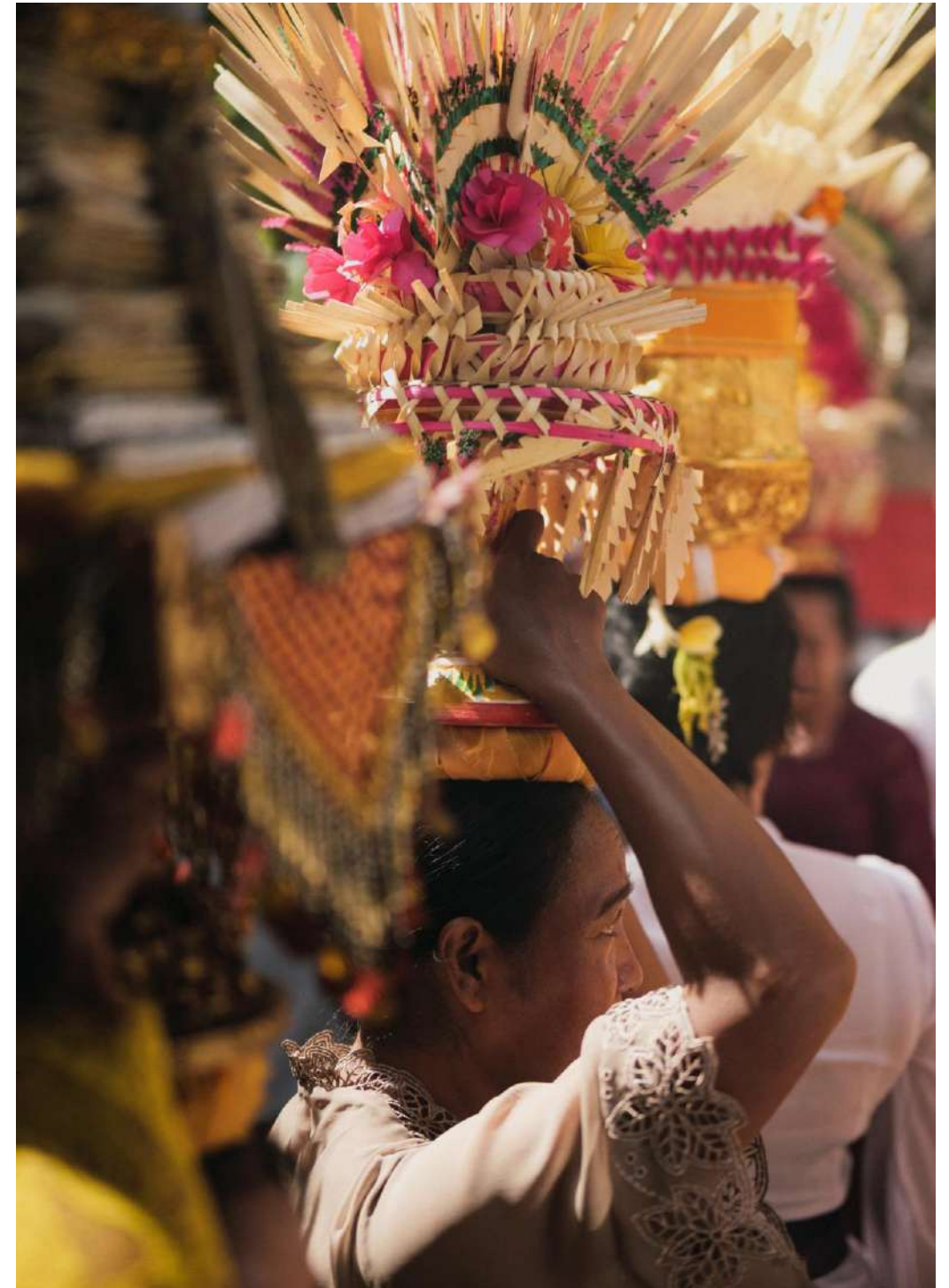
Kecak Dance is regularly performed in many places all over Bali. However, the best place to watch this spectacular show is at the Uluwatu Temple, where the dance is performed daily with the dramatic Uluwatu sunset as its backdrop.

Purnama

Every full and new moon
occurring at the entirety of Bali island

The full and new moon days have special importance for the Balinese, as their yearly calendar is based on the moon phases each month. The full moon in Bahasa Indonesia is called “Purnama”, meaning full moon but also complete, infinite, and perfect. It is believed that on this day the Moon God Chandra is showering his blessings and magic on the people by offering his light, reminding them of their own light inside.

On full moon days, which are celebrated island-wide, Balinese men and women, dressed up in traditional attire of a sarong and white shirt for the men, and sarong, corset, and a white lace kebaya for the women with a colourful belt around the waist. The Balinese will take the Purnama offerings to the temple, perform sacred rituals which include holy water, incense, flowers, and prayer, and then offer them to the Gods.

SPECIAL EVENTS IN BALI

MARCH

Nyepi

19 March
occurring at the entirety of Bali island

On Nyepi day, which is New Year's day in the Balinese Saka Calendar, the island of Bali turns off all lights and sounds, stops all traffic, deserts all worldly activities, and meditates, while complete silence and serenity reigns over the entire island - the island reduced its emissions by 5,000 metric tons of CO² (carbon dioxide) in one Nyepi Day.

No planes will land or take off for 24 hours. All traffic across Bali will be stopped. All shops are closed. No pedestrian traffic is allowed on the beach or the streets. There will be local watchmen known as pecalang to ascertain that this rule is strictly obeyed. At night, all lights will have to be turned off. Hotels will close all curtains so that no ray of light shines outside. All sound and music indoors should be held to its lowest volume.

On the eve of Nyepi, however, celebrations are held with large papier-mache giant effigies, called Ogoh-Ogoh, paraded throughout the streets and accompanied by traditional chanting and gamelan music. These are then torched and, it is believed, that with the conflagration, any evil spirits that have brought disease and misery to the island during the past year will have also been banished.

MAY

Ubud Food Festival

Each year, the Festival welcomes audiences and chefs from near and far to learn about Indonesia through its cuisine.

Piodalan at Aman Bali

Odalan, Piodalan, or Pujawali is a celebration to commemorate the inauguration day of a temple, a Mrajan (family temple), or a Palinggih (holy shrine). In Balinese, the word Piodalan means "being born" or "leaving", it originated from the word "Wedal". In some areas, the Piodalan ceremony is also called Wali, especially in Bangli and Karangasem areas.

Piodalan is a form of Yadnya, or a sincere sacrifice to Ida Sang Hyang Widhi which is held on the day the temple is born according to the Pawukon – the 210-day Balinese calendar. Therefore each temple has a different Piodalan day.

At the time of Piodalan, Palinggih, Mrajan, or public temples will be decorated with colourful fabrics and decorations made of coconuts such as penjor, and a variety of beautiful offerings. The one who leads the ceremony, in general, is a Sulinggih (high priest) or Pemangku (common priest) according to the complexity of the ceremony. When a large piodalan ceremony is performed, this ceremony can last three days, seven days, or even 42 days, as is usually done at Pura Agung Besakih and other large public temples in Bali. At the end of a series of Piodalan ceremonies, there is a closing ceremony called Nyineb.

SPECIAL EVENTS IN BALI

JUNE

Galungan and Kuningan

17 June for Galungan
27 June for Kuningan
occurring at the entirety of Bali island

Celebrated every 210 days according to the Hindu Saka Calendar, Galungan symbolises the victory of Dharma over Adharma or virtue over evil which has its origin in the mythology of “Mayadenawa”. It is believed that during the ten days of Galungan, all the gods, as well as the supreme deity Ida Sang Hyang Widi, will come down to earth and join the festivities. The Balinese also believe that the spirit of ancestors and deceased relatives return to visit their homes, and for this reason, the various rituals conducted and offerings given to welcome them.

During the festival, all across the island sprout tall bamboo poles called "penjor" – that are decorated with fruit, coconut leaves, and flowers, and set up on the right side at the entrance of every home. At each gate, one will also find small bamboo altars set up, especially for the holiday, each carrying woven palm-leaf offerings for the spirits.

The last and pinnacle event in the ten-day festival is called Kuningan. It is believed that on this particular day, the Supreme God Sang Hyang Widi descends to earth to give blessings to all the people. As a closure to the series of Galungan rituals, Kuningan also marks the return of the gods and all ancestors to their realm.

As one of the most important religious activities on the island, Galungan provides the best opportunity to observe the most fascinating part of Bali’s unique culture. A visit to Bali during the festival will surely be an unforgettable experience for all the senses.

AUGUST

Maybank Marathon

21 - 23 August

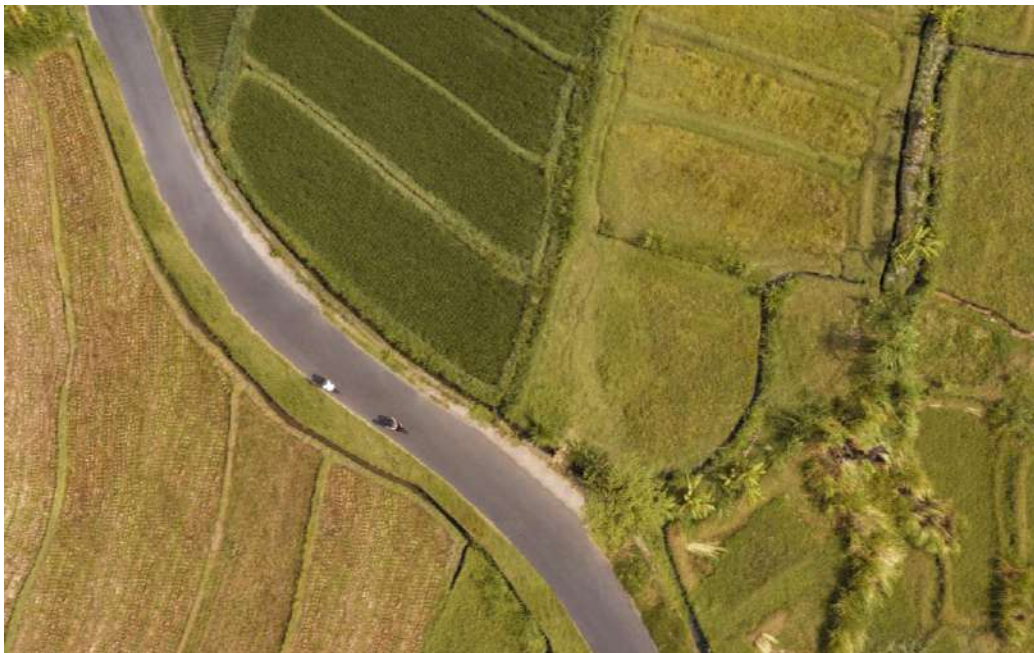

Formerly known as Bali Marathon, Maybank Marathon is a running event held in Gianyar, Bali. This annual race begins in front of the Bali Safari and Marine Park in Gianyar. From there, runners pass through the combination of flat and rocky road tracks with stunning picturesque Balinese countryside and traditional village scenery.

In 2020, Maybank Marathon became Indonesia's first and only 'Elite Label' marathon event, acknowledged by World Athletics and is included as one of World Athletics' marathon events.



OCTOBER

Saraswati

4 April & 31 October
occurring at the entirety of Bali island

Saraswati Day is when Balinese Hindus praise and thank the Goddess of knowledge for bestowing the ability to read, write and understand nature upon humans. The Goddess is portrayed as a beautiful, four-armed goddess riding on a white swan among water lilies holding a different object in each hand; a lontar manuscript, prayer beads, a lyre, and a pot of holy water. The swans symbolise prudence, so that one's knowledge may distinguish between good and evil, and the water lilies (Lotus) are symbols of holiness. The Lotus flower is the holiest for the Balinese. And the four arms represent the four aspects of human learning; mind, intellect, alertness, and ego.

Four days after Saraswati Day is Pagerwesi Day. "Pager" means fence and "Wesi" means iron. On this day, Balinese pray to Sang Hyang Pramesti Guru (manifestation of God) and put together offerings to their Sanggah (shrine in their home) and at all of their temples. The philosophy of this celebration is that they must keep knowledge, health, food, cloth, and gold high in their lives to keep the universe in balance.

OCTOBER

Ubud Writers and Readers Festival

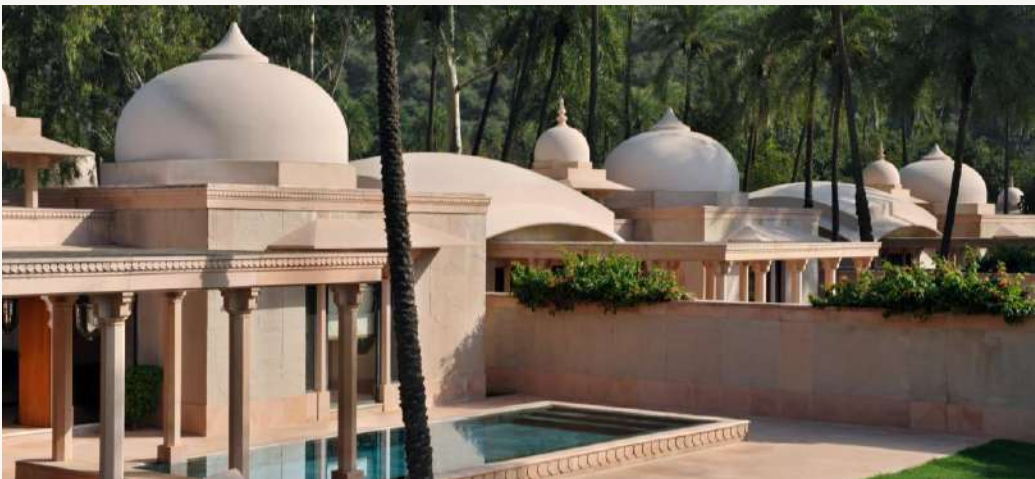

Ubud Writers & Readers Festival (UWRF) is one of the major annual projects of the not-for-profit Foundation, Yayasan Mudra Swari Saraswati. It was first conceived in 2004 by Janet DeNeeffe, co-founder of the Foundation, as a healing project in response to the first Bali bombing.

The Festival is known as the biggest Festival of words and ideas in Southeast Asia. It helps to promote Ubud as an art and cultural centre, showcases Indonesian writers on an international stage, and helps young Indonesians to reach their potential through educational programs and literature.

Proceeds from ticket sales are also used to cover free public events, and free workshops for local children and high school students and their teachers, and to subsidise the attendance of residents who otherwise could not afford to attend.





Complementary Destinations

Amanjiwo Central Java, Indonesia

Discover the cultural heartland of Java with a stay at Amanjiwo. The resort is located within a natural amphitheatre, with the limestone Menoreh Hills rising gently behind, the Kedu Plain in front, and four volcanoes (Sumbing and Sindoro to the west, Merbabu, and Merapi to the east) on the horizon. Amanjiwo looks out onto the 9th-century Buddhist sanctuary of Borobudur, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Several villages are within walking distance of the resort.

Amanwana Moyo Island, Indonesia

A natural paradise, Amanwana is on the beautiful island of Moyo, a veritable Eden in the Flores Sea. In 2022, Moyo Island was designated a National Park by the Indonesian government, ensuring that its stunning landscapes and diverse marine life are protected for generations to come. This allows Amanwana a uniquely intimate setting surrounded by true wilderness.

Amandira East Indonesian Archipelago

Sail the high seas of the East Indonesia archipelago, weave your way among UNESCO-protected islands and discover landscapes few are ever privy to with Amandira. Inspired by the Phinisi sailing vessels of old, twin-masted Amandira was custom designed and handcrafted from local hardwoods by Konjo artisans. Travelling under sail as well as by motor, the vessel combines the ancient romance of the spice trade with cutting-edge contemporary amenities.

Amanbagh Rajasthan, India

The topography of the Alwar region consists of sandy plains interspersed with craggy hills, a stark contrast to Amanbagh's setting which is an oasis of verdant greenery. Deriving its name from Aman, meaning 'peace' in Sanskrit, and Bagh, meaning 'garden' in Hindi, Amanbagh lies within a walled compound once used by the Maharajah of Alwar to site his mobile hunting camps in search of the elusive tigers known to roam the nearby hills. Long since abandoned, the trees and vegetation continued to thrive due to a reliable source of underground water. The resort is very much a modern-day 'Mughal Palace', conceived in the present, but paying homage to the architecture and design of India's golden age.





NUSA TENGGARA

LESSER SUNDA ISLANDS



Covering an area of approximately 31,200.15 hectares, the Moyo-Satonda National Park strengthens conservation efforts and enhances the natural and cultural heritage of the area. The Moyo-Satonda National Park consists of two major islands: Moyo Island and Satonda Island.

Its neighbouring Tambora National Park is known for its historical and geological impact while still maintaining its appeal as a natural landmark with rich biodiversity. In the southeast, Saleh Bay is known for being the home of the ever-elusive giant swimmer, the whale shark.

Bali and Lombok are the international gateways to Moyo Island. As one of the most accessible destinations in Southeast Asia, daily flights to Bali and Lombok are available from most major cities in Asia and Australia. Travellers from the United States or Europe tend to fly via Singapore. There are also domestic flights and ferry connections from the surrounding Indonesian islands.

Moyo - Satonda National Park Journey

Once a marine nature park, Moyo Island officially became Indonesia's 55th national park together with the neighbouring island of Satonda.

The experience of Moyo Island begins by air and sea, with a scenic flight from Denpasar to Sumbawa and a trip across the shimmering Flores Sea into Amanwana - the first tented camp resort in the world. Medang Island in the northwest, the rugged mountains of Sumbawa in the south, and Lombok's volcanic Mount Rinjani - at 3,726 metres, the third-highest mountain in Indonesia - are visible from Moyo. The island all but plugs the narrow entrance to Saleh Bay, famous for being the favourite sport of the whale sharks.

Moyo Island

An Indonesian wildlife reserve since 1976, Moyo Island lies east of Bali in the West Sumbawa regency. In August 2022, Moyo Island was designated a National Park by the Indonesian government. Surrounded by a marine reserve, Moyo Island is one of Indonesia's key areas of conservation and home to an extraordinary array of animal and plant life - an island for explorers, lovers of wildlife, and those seeking the solace of untouched nature.

Saleh Bay

Located just east of Moyo Island, Saleh Bay is known as the location for the second-largest whale shark (*Rhincodon typus*) population on earth with at least 99 whale sharks detected. UNESCO also recognises the presence of whale sharks in the bay and adds the Saleh-Moyo-Tambora areas to its biosphere reserves list in 2019. Unlike other places in the world, whale sharks at Saleh Bay can be found all year round.

Satonda Island

The island of Satonda is a rare phenomenon on earth. Formed by a volcanic eruption on the sea floor, the island boasts a crater lake well known for its salt water. Even, the lake contains more salt than the sea. Making it scientifically unique because the saltwater lake and its species-poor biota represent an ecosystem of global significance, unmatched by any other site currently known worldwide.

Depart to Satonda Island on Aman X or XX for a 75-minute journey to the island. Choose from a host of activities including kayaking on the large salt-water lake in the centre of Satonda. Jungle trekking, snorkelling, diving, and even some deep-sea fishing can also be enjoyed on this excursion. Take a picnic-style lunch on the beach or on board, completing an action-packed day that you will never forget.

Tambora National Park

Tambora National park is home to splendid nature, such as fall-season forest, high-landscape forest, and savanna forest, which is why it is dubbed the Africa of Sumbawa. Unlike other mountains in Lombok, Bali, or Java, hikers of Mount Tambora will be rewarded with little traffic and a well-marked path throughout the trek along its varied landscapes, from coffee plantations and dense jungle to the vast savannah. For wildlife enthusiasts, a constant serenade of healthy bird song will accompany your hike, a sure sign of a vibrant ecosystem as the mountain is home to the Crested White-eye, Hill Mynas, Rainbow Lorikeets, flying foxes, deer, horses, wild pigs, and rainforest trees, among many other things.





Amanwana

Featured Destination

The Peaceful Forest

Amanwana looks out over Amanwana Bay, a marine reserve, and beyond to the Flores Sea. Set back from the sea on the island's beachfront rainforest fringe, 15 standalone safari tents balance low-impact sustainability with hardwood-floored, high-ceilinged, air-conditioned, ensuite comfort, and macaques and wild deer roam freely among the camp.

Caves featuring exotic wildlife, bike trails, and waterfall treks await inland, but the most precious treasures are out at sea, where a technicolor reef showcases 75 percent of all known corals.

Amanwana's mission is not only to bear witness to the spectacular biodiversity beneath the waves but to preserve it too.

Guests are invited to join the camp's conservation team chaperoning newly hatched turtles from the sand to the sea, or to take part in the Amanwana coral-restoration programme, cultivating beds in the waters surrounding the island.

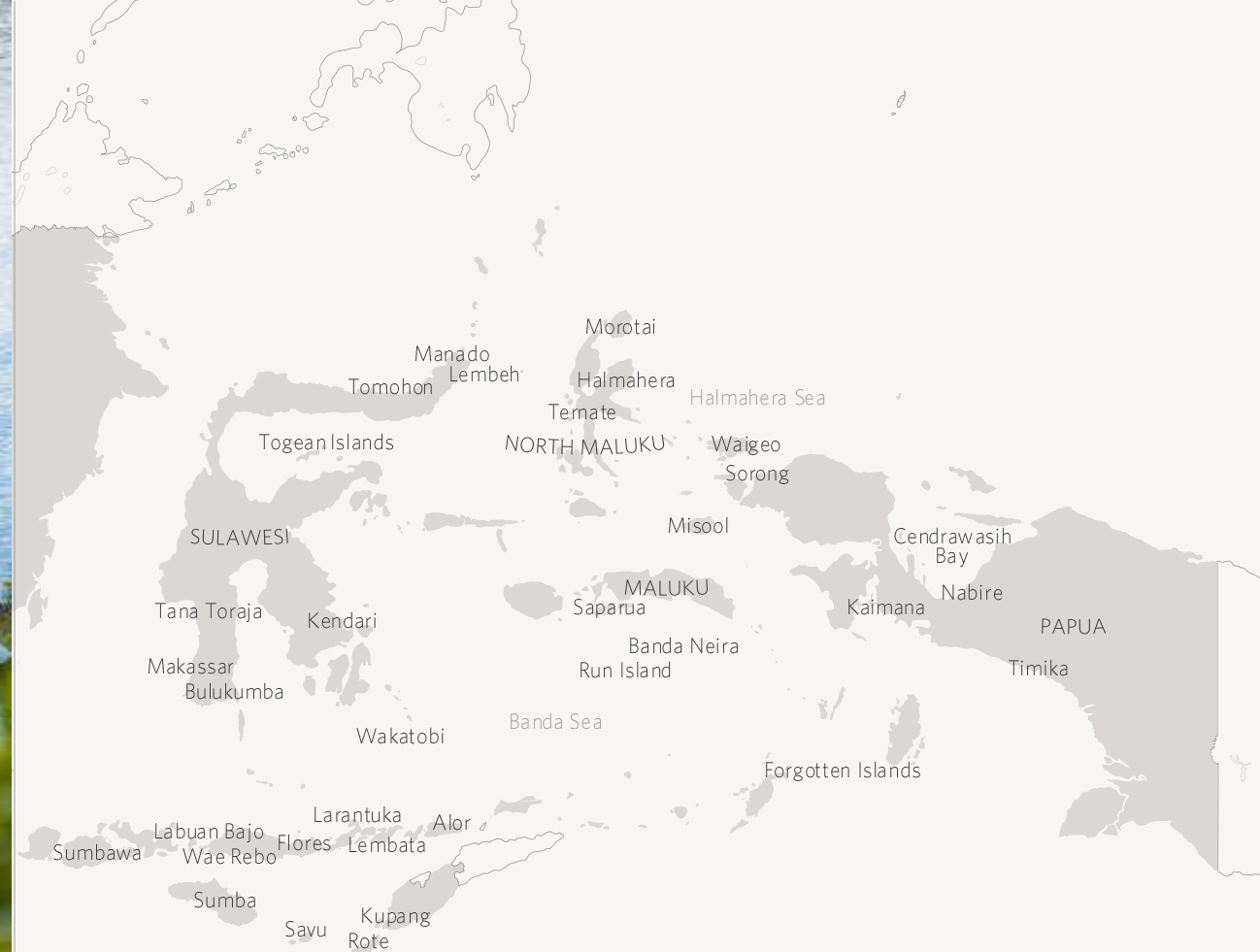

Alor Journey

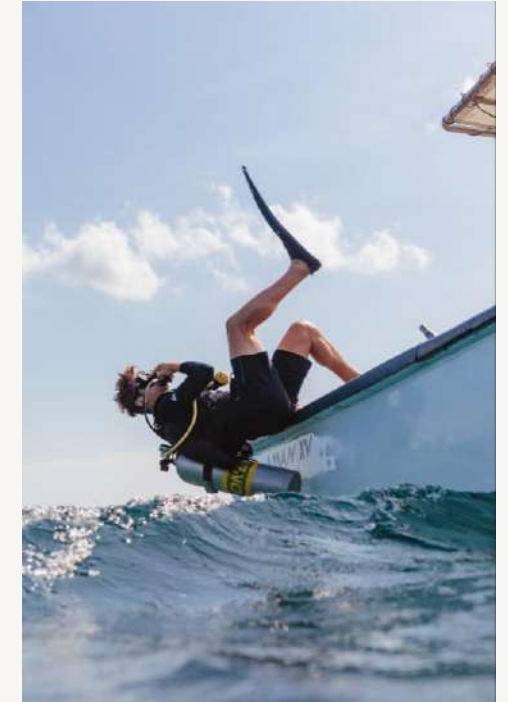
Alor is the least-visited part of the East Nusa Tenggara province. The unspoiled flora of the islands is paired with world-class diving for an all-around experience of natural beauty.

Pristine waters and beautiful coral reefs – which scorpionfish and pygmy seahorses call home – provide world-class diving, with opportunities to see sunfish, reef sharks, hammerheads, and even whales.

Spice Islands Journey

Four and a half degrees south of the Equator, the seven volcanic islands of the Banda archipelago were, for centuries, the world's only source of nutmeg, earning their nickname - the Spice Islands. Keep in mind, that this journey only takes place once a year.

Charming villages can be found on five of the islands, with traces of Dutch forts on Banda Neira, Banda Besar, and Run.



Triton Bay Journey

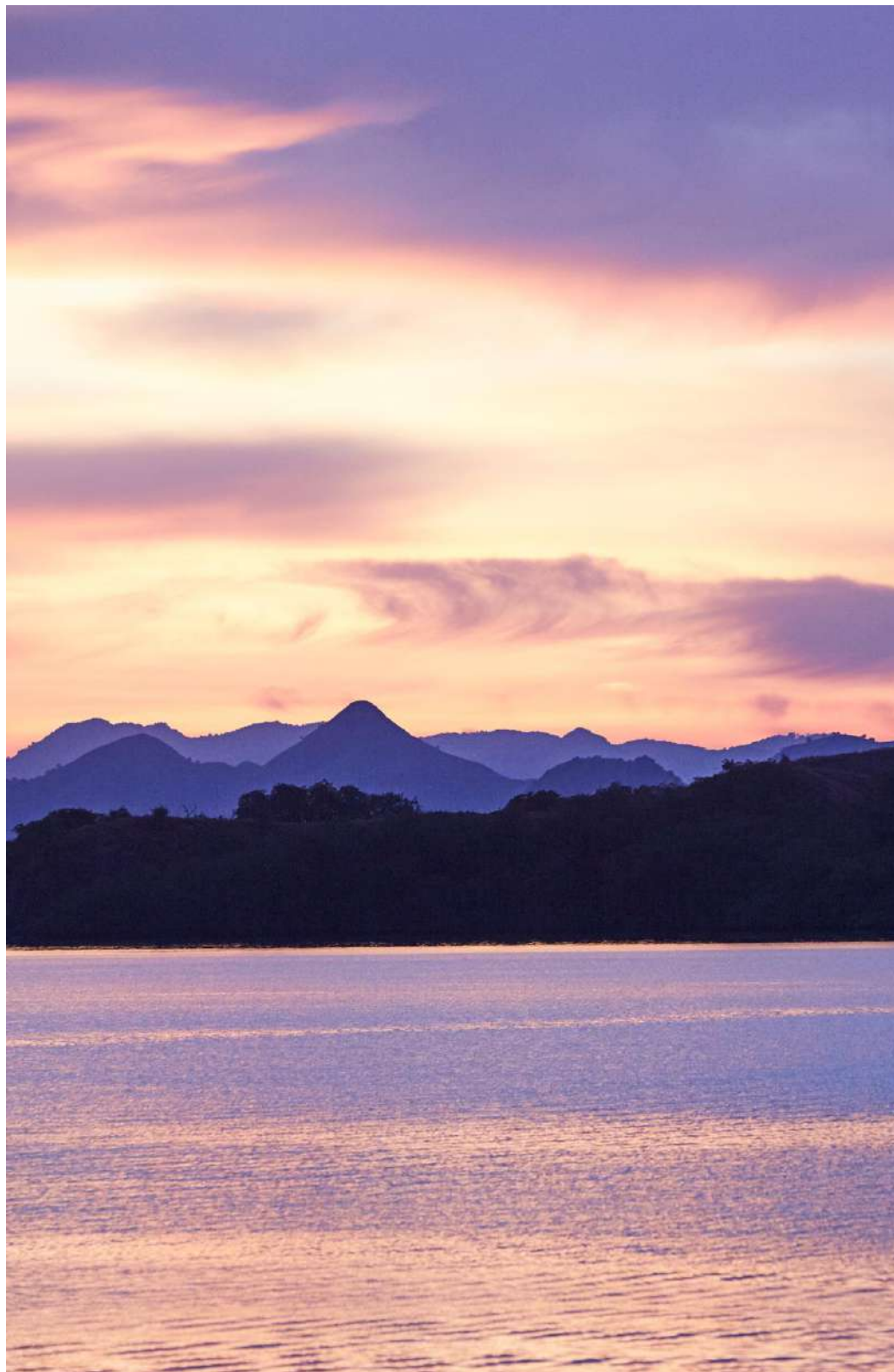
A pristine area, unspoiled by development, the Kaimana Marine Protected Area is a region still being explored, with new dive sites being located each year.

Raja Ampat Journey

Known as the Four Kings, these 40,000 square kilometres of the Indonesian archipelago in the northeast seas are where the Pacific and Indian Oceans collide.

These nutrient-rich waters nurture magnificent coral reefs and marine life unlike anywhere else. As beautiful above water as it is below, the islands are cloaked in exotic flora and fauna such as karst forests of endangered orchids.

Tokuwela Morotai Festival

Located north of the larger island of Halmahera in the province of North Maluku, the island of Morotai has a number of great beaches and interesting diving spots. The largest town here is Daruba in the south. To Morotai's north are the Philippines and to its east the Pacific Ocean. Not much remains to be seen from those hectic World War II days, except for several interesting wrecks to be explored underwater.

Nearby at Kao Bay in Halmahera, a half-submerged Japanese wreck named the Tosimaru can still be seen from shore. A shack filled with memorabilia of World War II collected by a private citizen and known as the Morotai Museum can be visited to remind visitors of those terrible war days, which will hopefully never occur again on this planet.

Bringing this rich history and culture to the global audience, the Tokuwela Morotai Festival consists of The Morotai Tour, Morotai Music Corner, and several competitions such as the Suratin Cup Competition, Regent Cup 2022 Competition, Ornamental Boat Competition, Morotai Cooking Competition, and Fun Dive, Snorkelling and Surfing Competition. Other exciting activities are an exploration of the Tosimaru shipwreck, a shark dive, and a historical trail of the World War II remnants that are scattered across the island.

Tomohon International Flower Festival

Tomohon International Flower Festival is a series of international-scale art and cultural events held by the Tomohon City Government in North Sulawesi Province. This annual event which is held along Jalan Tomohon was launched in 2006, to introduce and promote the arts and cultural richness of Tomohon City. Tomohon International Flower Festival participants come from various cities across Indonesia.

Complementing a visit to Tomohon City are natural and cultural landmarks located around the city such as Linow Lake, Bukit Doa, Waruga, Temboan Peak, Tumiperas Waterfall, Flower Villages, Lahendong Tourism Forest, Inspiration Hill, Sion Church, and Ekayana Pagoda. Tomohon City is also known for its extreme culinary delights as well as sweet and savoury street food: Jaha Rice, Klapertaart, Grilled Tilapia, Cakalang Fufu, and Colombi Satay.

The festival is held at Tanjung Bira, known for its natural beauty typical of Sulawesi Island. Its clear blue sea and stretching white sand are accompanied by the festival's culinary offerings that introduce various traditional cuisine of Bulukumba and its surrounding regions.

Festival Bahari Raja Ampat is held to highlight the region's rich culture and biodiversity. Taking place in the Capital of the Raja Ampat Regency, Waisai which is on Waigeo Island, this maritime festival offers a variety of events and activities. A wildlife excursion, an activity to get to know the flora and fauna in Raja Ampat and Papua in general, island hopping such as visiting Pianemo Island and the Fam Islands, and snorkelling and diving, for which the destination is globally known, are all available throughout the event.

Festival Pesona Selat Lembeh

at Bitung, North Sulawesi

Festival Pesona Selat Lembeh is an annual festival held every October. As the name implies, this tourism promotion festival takes place in Lembeh Strait, in the city of Bitung, North Sulawesi.

The Lembeh Strait has up to 95 dive spots, and diving in Lembeh Strait can reach a depth of 15 - 25 metres. There is almost no current, and all year round the water stays warm at just 24 to 30 degrees Celsius. Its unique ecosystem makes this place a home for nudibranchs, flamboyant squid, mimic octopus, and hairy frogfish. Its peculiarity has made divers call it "The World's Muck Diving Heaven" or a paradise for diving on the seabed. This designation is certainly not without reason. The natural character of the volcano that covers the underwater Lembeh Strait offers a rich biodiversity.

These extraordinarily beautiful animals are rare subjects for underwater photographers. For that reason, underwater photographers have dubbed the Lembeh Strait the "Paradise for Underwater Photography".

Another activity of the festival is coral planting which involves 200 divers planting 400 seedling coral reefs. This activity is a favourite for environmentalists and foreign tourists who are still unfamiliar with marine life.



A visit to Bitung is incomplete if you don't experience the Tangkoko Nature Reserve, home to black monkeys and the cute fist-sized tarsier with large saucer eyes - icons of the area. The Tangkoko Nature Reserve is a division known as the Wallace Line. An imaginary geographical line is given by Alfred Russel Wallace, a naturalist, explorer, geographer, anthropologist, biologist, and illustrator, known for independently conceiving the theory of evolution through natural selection.

Spice Island Festival

Amanwana Moyo Island, Indonesia

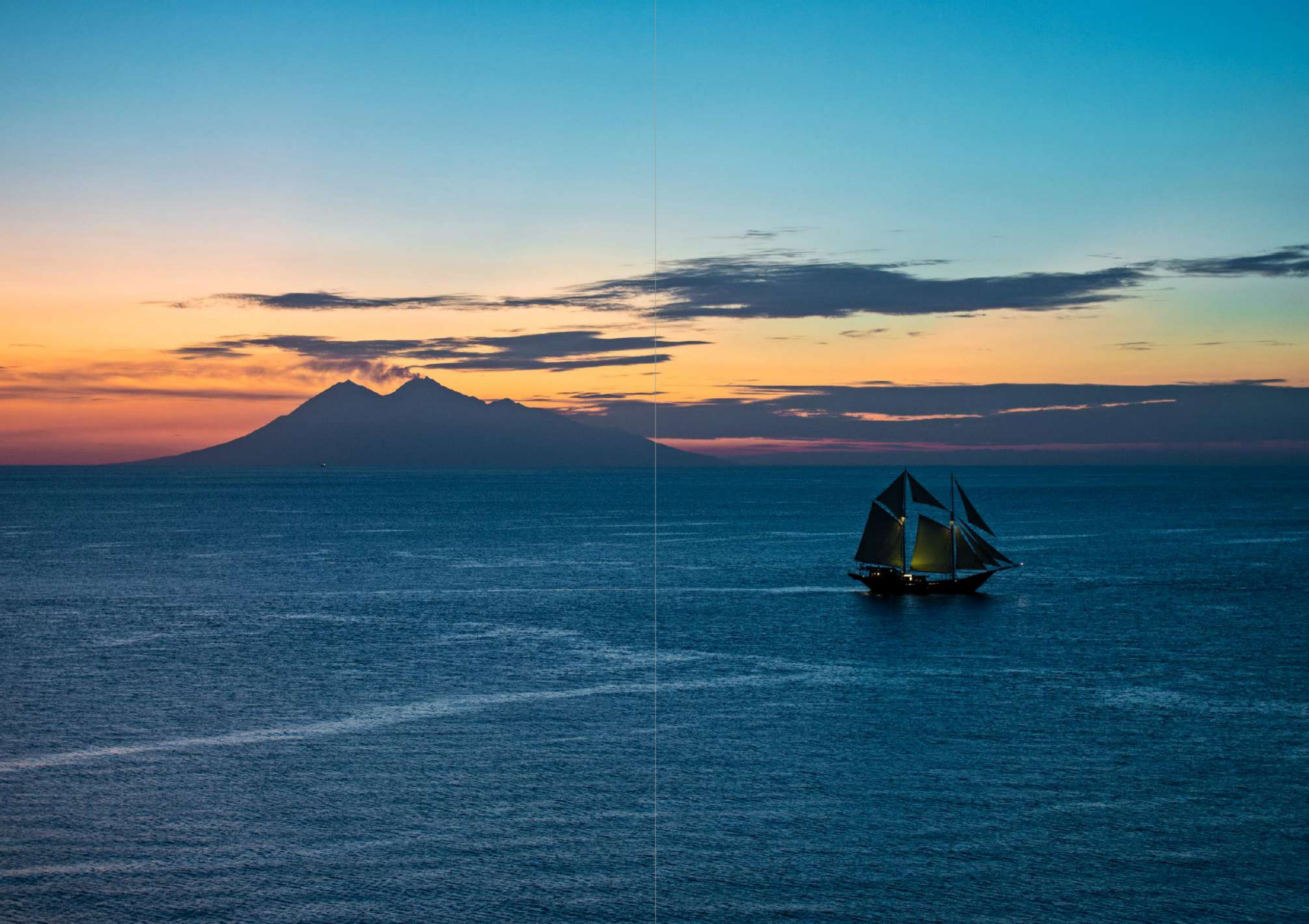

Balap Karung

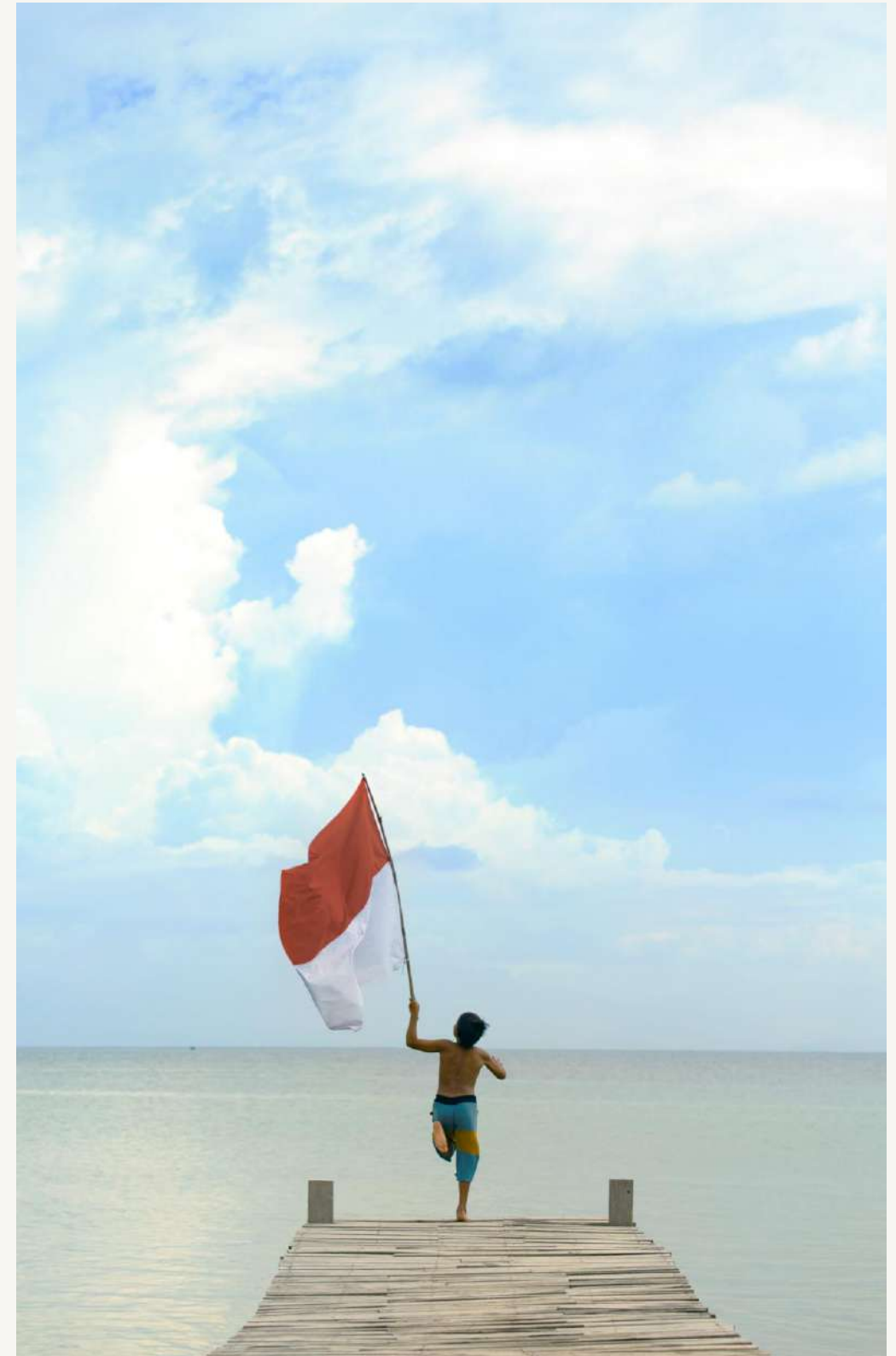

This game originated from the Dutch colonial era when they often played this game at their institutions, competing with both their fellow citizens and the Indonesians.

Makan Kerupuk

Kerupuk, salty, savory crackers, is not only a favourite side dish served with Indonesian cuisines such as Nasi Goreng and Nasi Campur but also a food item used in the well-known game Makan Kerupuk where the participants have to eat the kerupuk as fast as they can. This game holds great historical significance. During the colonial period, Indonesian soldiers were faced with a scarcity of food. Eating rice with kerupuk was nothing less than a treat for them. Hence, Makan Kerupuk is a reminder for every Indonesian to be grateful for the freedom struggles of their ancestors.

Panjat Pinang

Requiring both skill and determination, Panjat Pinang is a demanding teamwork game. It requires a group of participants to climb an Areca palm tree and reach the prizes at the top. Sounds easy, but it's quite a challenge. Participants must climb up a tree that is covered in oil, making it difficult to reach the top. This tricky yet hilarious activity brings laughter and cheers as participants fall down or claim victory.
